

It felt as if He were standing at my side telling me that He loves all God's creatures, including me. The peaceful feeling was beyond description. It would be awesome if all people could experience such a moving spiritual encounter. The following day Dale gathered numerous passages of scripture telling about Jesus going to the wilderness. The OCM on the Briscoe-Gates Ranch is a very, very special place. Thank you Dale!

Odds and Ends

Briscoe-Gates Ranch History – United States Geodetic Survey (USGS)

All across the continental US as well as in Alaska and Hawaii there is a network of survey monuments which are bronze disks about 8 to 10 cm. in diameter set in rock or permanent structures. The exact number can only be guessed, but there are reported to be one million or more in place in all manner of locations from city sidewalks and bridges to remote ridges and mountain tops. These have been set by surveyors since 1879 and are the basis for horizontal and vertical control for all the mapping done in the US.

Survey Monument Placement on Mountain Tops

Most of you reading this have probably been to a summit which had a monument in a prominent location that was easy to see. There may be a large rock at the summit and the monument will be cemented in place at the very highest point. If you have been lucky enough to visit OCM, then you were probably given a tour which included Lookout Point. It is upon this hill that one of these monuments exists. Here is a close up picture of it!!



On the next page is the exact government data from the USGS specific to our very own monument put in place in 1917 and confirmed in 1935. I wonder what the ranch looked like then – almost 100 years ago! Think you could find the monument using the highlighted directions below? Ha!

Maintenance / Construction Update:

- The all volunteer team of Mike Givens, Mike Schneider, Clifford Graef, and Andy Burnett re-roofed the Trophy House in October 2009. Rain had been entering the building between the major joints and the building was in jeopardy of being lost if not fixed soon. With Mike Givens' 30+ years experience leading the way, the crew worked about 10 hours a day for 2 days to complete the task. The roof seems to be holding up well after several rainfall events since the repair work.
- Michael Givens and Matthew Burnett were leaders on re-plumbing a house one Saturday.
- Matthew, Clifford, and Mike have changed oil, replaced filters, changed tires, installed batteries, fixed flats, and completed a brake check on ranch equipment.
- Mike Schneider welded a metal sign frame for the 4X4 OCM sign that has been installed at the camp entrance.
- Clifford installed 12 metal tamper-proof rat/mouse bait stations and glued these to cinder blocks.

- David Burnett and Joey Burnett spent time at Thanksgiving vacuuming and cleaning the Morgan building and blue trailer.
- Corinna Gunn and Pattie Burnett cleaned the Little House including vacuuming, removing trash, washing all towels, and scrubbing throughout.
- Mowing and weed-eating work has been done by John Grasshoff, Mike Schneider, Clifford Graef, Billy Williams, Matthew Burnett, Dale Burnett, Andy Burnett, Joey Burnett, and Mike Givens.
